Welcome and Call to Order- Mr. John Callahan welcomed and called the Meeting to Order at 6:05 PM, thanked everyone for attending. Mr. Callahan thanked Amy Wallace for her Board Development presentation on the Street Law and NYLaw School partnership and in school classes. Mr. Callahan reviewed that the Board would meet early on many upcoming Thursday meeting dates to continue the Board Development plan. The next one would be with Mr. Digant Bahl, our Financial consultant, who would review Charter School financing and other financial issues.

Mr. Callahan then spoke about the Board retreat on September 18 in the school and how that was also part of the Board Development plan.

Mr. Callahan asked if anyone had any questions on Consent Agenda, and he mentioned that Mr. Marsico had wanted to talk about the Union contract and a discussion followed, With everyone approving the new contract.

Financials-

Mr. Burke began reviewing the financials and shared his screen. Mr. Burke said that our finances are in good shape with 178 days of cash on hand. Mr. Burke mentioned that there had been a Finance Committee phone call earlier in the week that went into great detail on the financials. He reviewed the main points of the Financials, and there were no questions.

Executive Director Report:

Mr. Burke spoke about the opening of school, the summer PD, and how smoothly everything was moving. Mr. Burke talked about the STAR testing that was now ongoing. He reviewed hiring and the difficulty of finding suitable candidates. Mr. Burke spoke about the positivity of staff and scholars. He reviewed that the enrollment is 441.



Mr. Callahan asked about vaccinations in the school. Mr. Burke reported that we are pushing hard, but the vaccinations we know of are 42 and permission slips are at 67, but we expect many more vaccinations with sports and after school.

Chairman Report -

Mr. Callahan then reviewed details about the construction and the Saturday Board Retreat. Mr. Callahan asked Mr. Burke about the help for the gardens from Bronx Botanical Gardens, and he mentioned the muralist Alice Mizrachi.

Mr. Callahan then called for Committee Reports-Mr. Callahan reported that we had discussed the Finance Committee earlier, and there was a meeting this past Tuesday.

Academic Committee- Ms. Fuentes mentioned there was no meeting until after The STAR testing takes place.

Fundraising Committee-No meeting, and Mr. Callahan mentioned that this would happen in September.

New Business:

Mr. Sang talked about the possibility of Mr. Marsico using Columbia Business school volunteers.

Mr. O'Rouke moved to adjourn, seconded by Ms. Azriliant, and approved at 7:40 PM.

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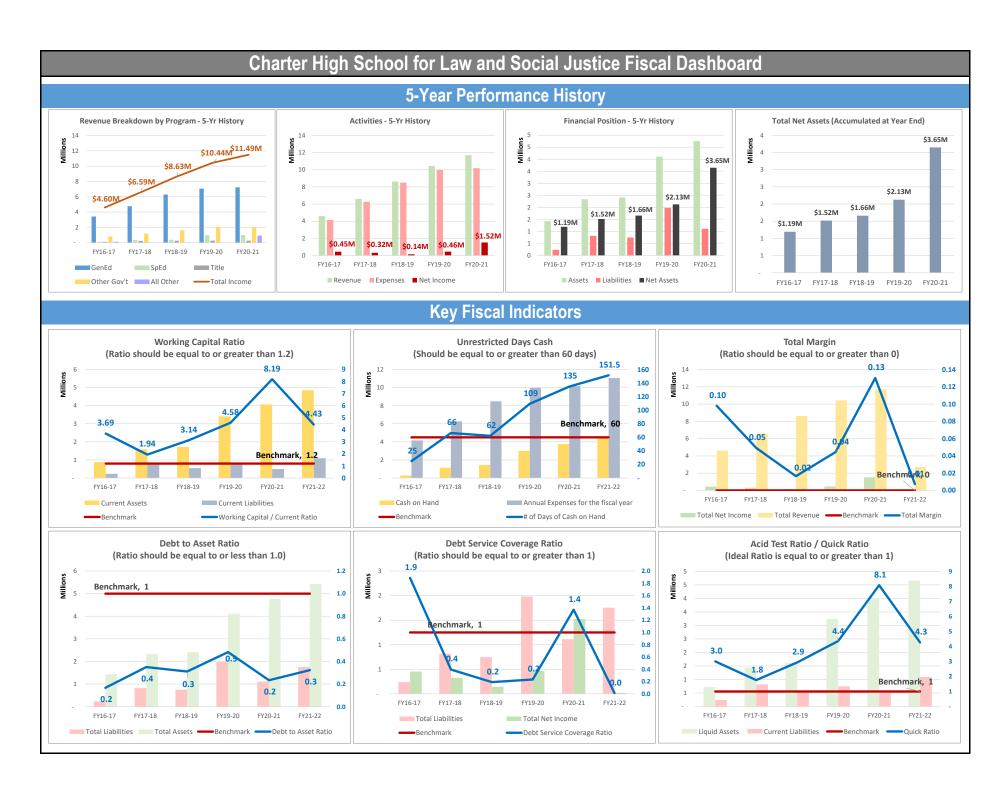

Notes to Financial Report For the Period Ending September 30, 2021

Enrollment

General Education:

• The General Ed revenue is based on estimated 440 FTE students. A true-up of the FTE is done in the October invoice.

Special Education:

• The Special Ed revenue is base on 60.40 FTE students. A true-up of the FTE is done in the October invoice.

Revenue and Support

Tuition & Lease Assistance

- Tuition revenue at Sep 30th totals \$2,619,971 or 26% of the Fiscal Year budget of \$10,496,949.
- General Ed revenue totals \$1,852,840 or 25% of the full year budget of \$7,411,800
- Special Ed revenue totals \$256,468 or 25% of the full year budget of \$1,042,494
- Lease Assistance revenue totals \$510,664 or 25% of the full year budget of \$2,042,655

Title and Other Government Grants.

- The application for the ESSER II grant (\$747,762 multi year) has been approved. The 20% initial deposit has been received and applied
 to the revenue recognized as of 9/30/21
- The Consolidated Application (Title Grant \$318,564) and the ARP (\$1,679,368 multi year) applications have been submitted.
 They are currently under review.
- eRate reimbursements totaling \$7,182 have been appropriately recognized as revenue with the offsetting expenses for a zero net effect.

Expenses

Salaries and Wages:

Salaries and Wages total \$1,341,844 or 23% of the full year budget of \$5,910,874

Payroll Taxes and Fringe Benefits:

• Taxes and Benefits total \$365,962 or 21% of the full year budget of \$1,736,477

Professional Services:

Professional Services total \$48,178 or 23% of the full year budget of \$213,600. Included in this category are legal fees, accounting and audit services, payroll processing charges and benefits administration.

Academic Consultants and Services:

Academic Consultants and Services costs total \$22,100 or 18% of the full year budget of \$125,000. Shared Space, as well as substitute teachers
are included in this category.

Curriculum and Classroom:

Curriculum and Classroom costs total \$41,546 or 8% of the full year budget of \$491,646. This is substantially low due to only one month of full operation.

Recruitment and Development:

Recruitment and Development costs total \$72,251 or 57% of the full year budget of \$127,000. This is due to spending the funds to recruit upfront.

General Administrative Expenses:

Administrative costs total \$91,436 or 47% of the full year budge of \$194,400. The year-to-date utilization is at 47% due to covid-19 supplies and materials needed to be purchased for the school opening

General Insurance:

• General Insurance costs total \$32,983 or 44% of the full year budget of \$75,00. The year-to-date utilization is at 44% due to a few upfront payments and changes in the coverage.

Technology:

Technology costs total \$77,656 or 56% of the full year budget of \$139,200. The year-to-date utilization is at 56% due to the monthly maintenance
cost paid to CTS. The budget included salaries for an IT personnel which was supposed to replace this monthly cost

Occupancy

Occupancy costs total \$554,563 or 25% of the full year budget of \$2,218,254. Included in this category are rent and deferred rent.

Other

• Miscellaneous and Other costs total \$21 or 3% of the yearly budget of \$600
